

Welcome to my first e-Portfolio. Photography books or normal paper portfolios are expensive, so I decided to publish an e-Portfolio simply to make these images more affordable; art must be accessible if its to have any value.

Let me explain briefly what I am trying accomplish artistically. My web site uses a quote from William Blake: "As a man is, so he sees." This quote recognizes the difference between seeing, a purely physical act, and perceiving, a mental-spiritual act based on the totality of a person's life experience.

I am *not* merely a documentarian. Rather, I create an image of what I perceived, extracting it

from the clutter of the totality of the data captured by the camera, which is something quite different. To do this, I remove my subject from its context by shifting the scale, depth of field, contrast, saturation, view angle, etc., to strip the viewer of his or her prejudice about what the subject is supposed to look like so they can look afresh at the world; the beggar and the poet may look at the same tree, but only the poet sees the miracle that is a tree.

This approach is not new, although the level of control offered by digital capture allows a more adventurous approach. Ansel Adams, who is famous for landscapes that most consider "realistic," was not a mere documentarian either. In *Examples: The Making of 40 Photographs* he wrote:

Most photographers realize that in their art, above all other graphic arts, subject can both dominate and restrict if the essential elements of creative expression are not clearly applied. The function of abstract art is to free the qualities of form, line, value, and color from the usually imperative domination of subject. A photograph can never be as free of the entanglements of subject as can a painting, *but the medium does permit a wide range of points-ofview and nonrealistic values.* [emphasis added] Finally, where practical I display my images in what I call "Camera Sonatas." In the world of music a composer juxtaposes and contrasts movements thereby enriching the listening experience, *e.g.*, fast versus slow, bright versus sad, 4/4 time versus 3/4 time, etc. I do the same thing with my images for the same reasons.

Let me close with a favorite quote of mine:

Thus I live at leisure, brandishing my wine cup and sounding my lute. I unroll paintings and face them in solitude; seated, I plumb the four ends of the earth...simply responding to the uninhabited wilderness, where grottoed peaks tower on high and cloudy forests mass in depth. The sages and virtuous men shed reflected light from the distant past and myriad delights are fused with their spirits and their thoughts. What should I do then? Freely expand my spirit, that is all. What should be placed higher than that which expands the spirit?




